

NBCP slams province for reversal of 30-day prescription renewal directive

The New Brunswick College of Pharmacists (NBCP) has <u>slammed the NB government's decision</u> to remove the 30-day limit for prescription drugs. Registrar Sam Lanctin says in a statement: "We are gravely disappointed in this decision... [Thursday's] political decision may have severe ramifications down the road." Lanctin adds that the problem of drug shortages won't go away by ignoring warnings from manufacturers and distributors. "It doesn't take much to disrupt a supply chain and limiting supplies in the short term was and still is the right thing to do," Lanctin says. "We are especially concerned with ongoing issues in India and China, where many of the ingredients for medications are sourced."

National

Health Canada issues warning about use of hydroxychloroquine

In an <u>advisory</u> issued over the weekend, Health Canada is warning that chloroquine and hydroxychloroquine may cause serious side effects, including heart rhythm problems. The risk of these side effects may increase at higher doses, or if the drugs are used in combination with other drugs, such as the antibiotic azithromycin. Patients should use these drugs only under the supervision of a physician. Health Canada is concerned that some people may be directly buying and using chloroquine and

hydroxychloroquine to prevent or treat COVID-19 without a prescription. CPhA has produced <u>additional guidance</u> (<u>en français</u>) on this issue, and will continue to update the statement as new evidence is available.

COVID-19 global supply chain disruptions – a catalyst for long-term changes?

COVID-19 continues to claim lives and create economic turmoil around the world. The pandemic is also disrupting supply chains, deterring business investment and stymying consumer spending. In a new report, <u>COVID-19 Global Supply Chain Disruptions – A</u> <u>Catalyst for Long-Term Changes?</u>, the Conference Board of Canada explores the challenges businesses are facing and emerging opportunities that will put businesses in a more solid position to face the new economic, business and technological realities once the crisis is over.

International

APhA running public service announcement cautioning about fake products

In its continued efforts to keep communities healthy and informed during the COVID-19 pandemic, the American Pharmacists Association (APhA) is running a <u>public service announcement</u> that cautions consumers and patients about fake and substandard COVID-19 products and associated scams.

NY governor signs executive order to allow pharmacists to order and administer COVID-19 tests

New York governor Andrew Cuomo <u>issued an executive order</u> allowing pharmacists to order and administer tests for COVID-19 and its antibodies for patients with suspected COVID-19 or suspected of having recovered from the virus. The order is intended to significantly expand access to testing in New York and reflects an increasing recognition of the role pharmacists will play in expanding access to testing services.

FDA issues drug safety statement on hydroxychloroquine

The US Food and Drug Administration issued a <u>Drug Safety Communication</u> regarding known side effects of hydroxychloroquine and chloroquine, including serious and potentially life-threatening heart rhythm problems, that have been reported with their use for the treatment or prevention of COVID-19, for which they are not approved by the FDA. These risks, which are in the drug labels for their approved uses, may be mitigated when health care professionals closely screen and supervise these patients such as in a hospital setting or a clinical trial, as indicated in the Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) for these drugs to treat COVID-19.

Pharmacy never more important: FIP

Pharmacists play a <u>critical role in protecting the public</u> from inappropriate advice and misinformation around medicines, the International Pharmaceutical Federation (FIP) CEO, Catherine Duggan, believes. Speaking during a FIP COVID-19 webinar, Duggan says the pandemic has heightened the focus on patient safety in the pharmacy sector. "Patient safety's never [been] more important than now," she says. "If we think about where we are in our different countries, in our different localities, as we face this global pandemic, patient safety risks are becoming more heightened than ever."
