### CPhA's Barry Power speaks to CBC Radio on the need to maintain stable drug supply

Barry Power, CPhA's senior director, digital content, spoke to 11 CBC Morning shows across the country today. During the interviews, which mainly focused on drug supply issues, such as the temporary 30-day supply limits, Barry stressed that the 30-day supply would get patients through 2 quarantine periods if they are self-isolating. ### Disruption of immunization schedules during the pandemic: Is a delay a problem?

During the COVID-19 pandemic, many pharmacists and other providers have stopped providing routine immunization to support reallocation of health care provider time and social distancing. Patients may have questions about the impact of a delay. CPhA has developed a statement on the disruption of immunization schedules to help support pharmacists' decision-making in this area (English, French).

## New Brunswick Department of Health releases updated COVID-19 testing guidelines

On March 29, the New Brunswick Department of Health released <u>updated guidelines</u> for testing symptomatic health care workers and staff. The guidelines state that health care workers and staff, including pharmacists and pharmacy technicians, who are symptomatic and provide direct patient contact should be tested for COVID-19 regardless of travel history, and that they should stay off work and self-isolate until test results are negative.

## PAS releases joint statement on use of hydroxychloroquine and azithromycin for COVID-19

In a joint message to Saskatchewan's doctors, registered nurses, nurse practitioners and pharmacists, the Pharmacy Association of Saskatchewan released <u>a statement</u> outlining the lack of current scientific evidence around the use of hydroxychloroquine and azithromycin for COVID-19, as well as growing concerns about shortages and demand for these medications.

## National

## Health Canada clarifies face mask issues, including use beyond expiry date

Health Canada has issued new guidance for health care providers on <u>use of the various types of masks and respirators</u> during the COVID-19 outbreak. The guidance addresses N95 respirators and surgical/medical masks and their use beyond their expiry date as long as certain conditions are met.

## Health Canada issues statement urging Canadians not to buy more medications than usual

Over the past 2 weeks, CPhA has been urging the federal government to support efforts and messaging about the importance of protecting and maintaining a stable drug supply. Today Health Canada issued a statement recognizing the impact that supply issues could have on Canadians. The release notes that Health Canada understands the stress caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and recognizes that Canadians may be concerned about not being able to get medications they rely on for themselves and their loved ones. While the Government of Canada recommends that Canadians refill their prescriptions now so that they do not have to go to a pharmacy if they become sick, it is urging patients not to buy more medication than usual. This will help ensure that all Canadians continue to have access to the medications they need and it will also help prevent drug shortages. #### Beware of COVID-19 scams

With the COVID-19 crisis as the backdrop, fraudsters appear to be redoubling their efforts to steal information or money from unsuspecting users and sending fake emails and text messages as bait in a scheme known as phishing. Some of the schemes come disguised as messages from Shoppers Drug Mart, Public Health Agency of Canada or the World Health Organization. In all cases, the goal is to steal a user's information or money, or infect their devices with malware. #### FDA approves limited use of malaria drugs for COVID-19

A limited emergency-use authorization for 2 antimalarial drugs has been issued by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to treat coronavirus patients. In a <u>statement</u> published yesterday, the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services detailed recent donations of medicine to a national stockpile -- including chloroquine and hydroxychloroquine, both being investigated as potential COVID-19 treatments.
