# **The Heavy Stuff**

2SLGBTQ+ people experience healthcare differently



Greater prevalence of arthritis (women)




- Greater prevalence of asthma (women)
- Anal cancer rates up to 30x greater for cis-men who have sex with cis-men
- $(\rightarrow)$
- Increased risk for HIV and other STBBIs
- Mental health disparities (see next slides)

**Mental Health Outcomes** 




- Increased depression/anxiety
- Increased suicidal ideation (3.5-4x higher)
- Increased substance use
- Healthcare professionals and healthcare settings are top sources of perceived stigma


- Avoidance

#### **Strategy #1: Intake Forms**




Less confronting than direct ask

Provides patient with the power to disclose what they wish



Normalizes collection of this data






Can be used as educational opportunity for others



#### **Strategy #2: Reduce Cis/Hetero-normativity**

- Critically review procedures
  - Contraception
  - PrEP management
- Sex-based calculations
- Consider different types of relationships
  - Erectile dysfunction
  - Sexual health care
  - Partner/family support





# **Strategy #3: Invest in Education for <u>ALL</u> Staff**

- Everyone plays a critical role
- A patient's experience starts upon entering the pharmacy...
- ...and ends upon leaving
- Investing in education for <u>all</u> may decrease negative experiences





#### **Strategy #4: Representation / Symbols**

- Display of symbols / resources
- Allows the community to be seen
- Must be done meaningfully and not performatively
- Ensure <u>all</u> staff have received orientation/ training on inclusivity



#### **Strategy #5: Learn**

#### **Topics to focus on:**

- Feminizing hormone therapy
  - Estrogen and anti-androgens
- Masculinizing hormone therapy
  - Testosterone
- Administration techniques
- Administration supplies

#### **Strategy #6: Pronoun Normalization**



Displaying pronouns (nametag)

Documenting pronouns (intake forms, patient records)




Using pronouns in patient conversations





#### **Strategy #7: Let Go of Assumptions**

- Patients' goals of therapy for gender affirming care may differ
- Community stereotypes exist
  - Gay = HIV, Trans = mental health
- Gender expression may differ from gender identity





#### **Strategy #8: Value Discretion**

- Patients may associate medications with stigma
- Privacy central to community practice
- Provide patients with the choice for consultation rooms



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### **Strategy #9: Be an Advocate (not just ally!)**

- Be at the forefront of system change!
- More voices = greater change
- Advocacy is <u>everyone's</u> place

  - 'Gay' professor
  - The 'trans' patient
